Special Events Manager, Special Olympics of Colorado

Introduced by **Mike McMahon**, our guest speaker this morning was <u>Britanny Saunier</u> with Special Olympics. Britanny has been involved with Special Olympics for about a year and enjoys her job with the organization. While Special Olympics started as an effort to provide opportunities for people with developmental challenges to participate in various sports, it continues to evolve into providing lifelong opportunities and support for these special people.

Special Olympics are now engaged in five different areas including building inclusive

schools, developing leaders, strengthening communities, promoting self-sufficiency and improv-

ing health and quality of life. Efforts by Special Olympics in first three areas have resulted in introducing 78% more children with intellectual disabilities into the main stream schools. It has also resulted in 75% of typically developing youth reporting that their attitudes about bullying have changed and 84% of all students have reported that these programs have been life changing.

Special Olympics is now providing training for intellectually disabled people to develop work skills that help them become self-sufficient and improve their quality of life. The average athlete visits over 50 different physicians with little

or no results in identifying and treating their health issues. Without proper treatment, these issues can develop to become life threatening. Special Olympics provides training for health professionals in seven different disciplines to better serve intellectually disabled people. They also provide over 1.2 million health screenings on a global basis.

The sports activities are conducted on a local, regional and state championship levels. They host six different state championships and send athletes on to compete in the World Games. Special Olympics have many opportunities for volunteers to get involved. They range

from coaching to helping conduct events to working in their offices and even with fundraising. Their fundraising events include 6 polar plunges, a golf tournament, a plane pull and their *"Hall of Fame"* event. Law enforcement has traditionally provided much support to Special Olympics. They will be conducting *"Tip A Cop"* events with Chilies and Red Robin restaurants. This event has law enforcement officers as servers in these restaurants for a day when all tips go the Special Olympics programs.
