Speaker

The speaker for the September 14, 2007 meeting of The Optimist Club of Monaco South was member **Craig Eley**. Noting that this upcoming Monday was Constitution Day, his topic was "Constitutional Quirks," during which he gave Club members ammunition to throw at the Liberty Day kids the next time they are confronted by them at a Rockies game.

Rhode Island and North Carolina, Craig mentioned, refused to approve the Constitution (in fact, it was voted down 10-1 in a popular vote in Rhode Island) and so were not part of the United States until more than a year after ratification of the Constitution. Thus, they missed out on voting in the first presidential election, so George Washington had to win unanimously without their votes. Once these two states realized that they would not be able to go it alone, they joined up.

There have been more than 10,000 Constitutional amendments introduced into Congress over the centuries, but only 33 have obtained the required two-thirds vote of both houses and been referred to the states. Of those, six have failed to pass.

The 13th Amendment, which outlawed slavery, was not approved by Mississippi until 1995, although Mississippi, like all other states, was bound by it when it was ratified in 1865. Other examples of states being late to the party were Tennessee, which did not approve the 15th Amendment (giving former male slaves the right to vote) until 10 years ago, in 1997, and Mississippi (again) not approving the 19th Amendment (women's suffrage) until 1984.

The most recent amendment, the 27th, prohibits Congress from passing a law to raise its pay unless the raise becomes effective only after the next election. This was proposed with the original 10 amendments

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but was not ratified by enough states until 1992, 203 years later. This unprecedented delay between proposal and passage came about after Greg Watson, a Texas college student. came across the moribund

amendment in 1982 while looking for a research paper topic. He noticed that the amendment contained no deadline for ratification, so he wrote a paper on the premise that it could still be ratified if enough states approved it. His teacher was unimpressed by his argument and gave him a "C," noting that Greg's premise was "improbable."

While this grade would have been welcomed by most Monaco South members, Greg was not satisfied. Over the ensuing decade he contacted state legislatures and persisted until the amendment was approved by enough states to gain ratification in 1992.

Greg might have won the battle but lost the war, however, as Congress has managed to ignore the amendment. His teacher, however, who was contacted by reporters when the amendment gained ratification, did apologize for the "C."

Another bit of Constitutional trivia revealed by Craig was the fact that there is one part of the Constitution which cannot, by its terms, be amended. This appears in Article V, which

provides that a state's voting power in the Senate cannot be reduced without its consent, and that this provision is not subject to amendment. This was intended to prevent states from ganging up on another state and stripping it of its voting rights. Quite a suspicious bunch, the Founding Fathers.



Craia related that Constitution Day was created when Senator Robert Byrd (who reportedly keeps a copy of the Constitution in his pocket at all times) slipped a provision into a funding bill in 2004. It not only September made 17 Constitution Day, but

requires that all schools that receive federal funds teach the Constitution on September 17 of each year. Sen. Byrd, however, included no penalty for not teaching the Constitution, nor provided any funding to help schools teach it. Thus, the requirement is often ignored.

Because the 10th Amendment reserves to the states those powers not specifically granted to the federal government, and since the Constitution does not mention anything about education, Craig reported that there are those scholars who have suggested that the Constitution Day teaching requirement is, itself, unconstitutional.
