JAY POLLACK, Alta Vista Center

Today's Speaker was Jay Pollack. Jay spoke about the Alta Vista Center for Autism. Jay's

daughter Carissa, who is twelve, was diagnosed with autism when she was 20 months old.

Autism is a complex neurobiological disorder that typically

appears by age 3 and last throughout a person's lifetime. It is part of a group of disorders known as Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) that affect a person's ability to communicate, to reason, and to interact with others. Today, 1 in 150 children have autism. It is more common that pediatric cancer, diabetes, and AIDS combined. Autism occurs in all racial, ethnic, and social groups and is four times more likely to strike boys than girls. Symptoms can range from mild to severe.

In Carissa's case, Jay spoke about how at 12 month's she stopped making noises of any kind. She would not communicate with her family and

would even try to leave the room rather than interact with her family. Once her condition was diagnosed, finding resources to help her and the family, were very hard to locate. Early treatment focused on the cause of her condition rather than help in dealing with daily tasks. She was not progressing and the frustration and stress was difficult on the entire family.

Colorado ranks near the bottom nationally, in resources for autistic children. Jay's family struggled to find competent help and therapy for Carissa. Of the 40 hours of recommended therapy for her, she was able to get about 10. Unable to communicate with her mom and dad, she would throw tantrums when distressed. Jay and his wife would have to guess what it was that she needed or wanted. When she started public schools in 2000, they found Douglass County was not trained to deal with the needs for autistic kids.

When Jay's family found the Alta Vista Center, it was exactly what they needed. Carissa worked with specialized therapists, trained to work with autistic children. Her progress was measurable and her ability to communicate and interact with
