<u>Rockies Baseball</u>: **Michael Chavez** announced that he needs 45 bodies to help pass out bobble-head





# Some curious things you might not know about Colorado

- ⇒ <u>Highest Climb</u>. The highest vertical climb is not on a mountain but up the north side of the Black Canyon. Rising 1,700 feet, this sheer rock face is even higher than the famous Diamond on Longs Peak and was not conquered until 1969.
- ⇒ Deepest Snow. In 1899 Crested Butte recorded 254 inches of snow near the top of Kebler Pass. That year, snow buried a train near Leadville and left only stove pipes showing above cabins at many mountain towns. Usually, Wolf Creek Pass near Pagosa Springs gets the most snow in Colorado.
- ⇒ Oldest Hotel. The Peck House in the little town of Empire, near Berthoud Pass, is Colorado's oldest hotel. It was built in 1859 by James Peck. Early guests included President Ulysses S. Grant and other famous people.

## Erin McKay H.E.A.R. Project

Our speaker for today was introduced by Jon



Wachter. Ms. Erin McKay is the Vice President of Development for the "helping children in Colorado hear through early intervention, amplification and rehabilitation (H.E.A.R.). Their mission is dedi-

cated to providing financial assistance to Colorado children who are deaf or hard of hearing. Funding is provided for amplification, rehabilitation and associated services.

Erin first thanked the members of our club who had participated in their fund raiser H.E.A.R. last Halloween (including Jon ROJECT Wachter, JR Gieck, and

others). Erin explained that their organization is strictly local and deals with kids within the Denver Metro area. The organization provides financial assistance to Colorado children who are deaf and hard of hearing and do not qualify for public funding.

Erin said about 30,000 children in Colorado have significant hearing loss. It is estimated that 2,500 to 3,000 children have hearing loss that requires hearing aids or a cochlear implant. Research indicates that

children who receive hearing care early in life may develop language on par with their hearing peers.

Hearing aids cost up to \$6,000 per child and are typically not fully covered by health insurance, leaving families with significant bills. Public funding for hearing care is only provided to families with extremely limited incomes without appropriate amplification

The H.E.A.R. Projects goal is to ease the family's financial burden to assure that children receive the hearing care that they need to thrive developmentally, socially and academically The Project is a 501(C)3 organization, which means that gifts are tax deductible.
