#### From Ron Gustus, Club Finances 101

Unlike many service clubs no portion of weekly breakfast, coffee, or roll costs are included in annual/quarterly member dues. For each meeting the objective is to break-even on these costs and member charges are variable based on their choice. Charges are as follows:

- Full breakfast, plus tax and room charge = \$7
- Coffee only and room charge = \$2
- Roll only and room charge = \$2
- Coffee, roll, and room charge = \$3
- Orange Juice and room charge = \$2

Members attending and not having anything to eat or drink should pay \$1 to the cashier to cover the room charge. The Club pays costs for project guests, <u>potential new members</u>, and speakers. <u>Nonpotential</u> member guest costs are to be paid by the host member. Remember **Don St. John** has meal tickets available for members wanting to pay for multiple week charges.

#### Our Speaker this Week Congresswoman Diana DeGette

**Paul Bernard** introduced our First Congressional District Representative in Washington, D.C., Diana DeGette. Paul pronounced her last name correctly, which has been difficult for President Obama, according to Diana DeGette.

Representative DeGette chose to speak on her favorite subject and project, stem cell research. There have been numerous ethical issues, slowing the progress of research over the years. Stem cells are cells with the potential to develop into many different types of cells in the body. There are two main types of stem cells: embryonic and adult. Doctors and scientists are excited about stem cells because they have potential in many different areas of health and medical research. Studying stem cells may help explain how serious conditions such as birth defects and cancer come about. Stem cells may one day be used to make cells and tissues for therapy of many diseases, including Parkinson's disease, Alzheimer's disease, spinal cord injury, heart disease, diabetes, and arthritis.

Moral treatment of embryos; the end that scientists hope to achieve is the relief of human suffering. That this is a humanitarian and worthy end is not in dispute. The controversy is about the means, namely the



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consumption of donated embryos.

Congresswomen DeGette is calling for more funding and more people researching because we are on the verge of breakthroughs. The challenges are huge. A lively question and answer session ensued, during which Ms. DeGette reported that Congress has not voted a pay increase for themselves.
