Wooden Nickel Chips: The Lucky badge wearer was Jon Wachter, but he too came up short.



Our Speaker: Phil Hahn, Project Manager

For Building the Hoover Dam Bypass Bridge

Speaker; **Tom Wos** introduced guest speaker Phil Hahn, his friend and fellow engineer, of the HDR Engineering firm. Phil was here this morning to present the fascinating story



detailing the construction of the Hoover Dam By-Pass Bridge, aka the Mike O'Callaghan – Pat Tillman Memorial Bridge. The project consisted of a multitude of companies, multi-national corporations and local businesses.

It was a wonderful presentation and everyone was consumed by the enormity of the entire project. HDR played a key role as the design and construction coordinator for the new bridge. The project commenced in 2001 after the environmental impact study project was completed. The Fed's took over from NV and AZ in

1997. The new by-pass bridge was necessary because the original highway over Hoover Dam had become a major bottleneck for traffic. Three options were considered before final site plans were approved and commenced in 2001.

The construction is a "twin rib arch" complex, with an adjacent highline system for delivering materials and construction equipment. A pre-cast cement facility was built in nearby Boulder City to expedite the manufacturing of the 10 foot pre-cast pillars used in erecting the hollow core supports. The hollow core design is to allow for the extreme heat fluctuations of the area. Cantilevers and 115 foot steel girders formed the skeletal structure.

The bridge rises to 880 feet and spans 1060 highway feet on a 1900 foot bridge deck. The roadway is 4-lane with speeds allowed up to 60 mph. Limited walking access is still available on Hoover Dam, but on a controlled basis. All major structural components are deep embedded into the existing rock and granite. The construction crews worked 24/7 from both sides of the bridge, one on the Nevada side and one on the Arizona side. When the two sides met in the middle for coupling they were within 1/2 inch of perfect, a truly remarkable feat in both engineering and construction. Kind of like the golden spike in 1869 at Promontory Utah. During the 10 years of work only one life was lost. The ribbon cutting dedication took place on October 14, 2010 and involved everyone who had worked on the project. The only wrinkle was a lone BASE jumper attempting to make history, but it was not his day and he was quietly taken away. The Bureau of Reclamation handles security and works closely with both states on security matters.

During the Q & A period, **Wyatt McCallie** was pleased to point out that his firm CH2M was key in getting the Environmental Impact Study completed. Right on Wyatt! All in all, it was wonderfully informative and enlightening presentation. We all hope to see our guest, Phil Hahn again.
