Christmas Tree Lot Finale: Now that all the heavy lifting is done, tree lot chairman, Joe Marci,

made it back to Denver. He gave us a preliminary report on the overall sales. A total of 1,065 of the 1,087 trees inventoried were sold (most for a profit). The 22 trees not sold were donated to Dolls for Daughters, Denver Public Schools, or given to companies that had supported the tree lot with donations of goods and services. We also sold out of wreaths and set a record for

food consumed. The membership participation goal was met with 101 different members working the lot. Joe reports that 204 Noble Fir, 203 Douglas Fir, 169 Nordman, 175 Fraser, 85 Canaan, 78 Balsam, 76 Scotch Pine, 62 White Pine, and 45 forest cut Douglas Fir were sold. "Wait a minute; that adds up to 1,097 trees. Maybe we did better than we thought." Joe gave special thanks to Greg Young, Mike Miller, Garv Miller and all the other Millers (does that include Miller Lite) that helped with administrative duties while he was out of town. Other members handling special duties included Craig Eley on the Santa Haus, Steve Kady with signage, Ron Cisco food inventory, Ralph Pedersen banker and the entire Board of Directors, Day Managers who handled manpower.

# **Brain Bowl Overview** Karl Geil

The Brain Bowl is coming! Nope, the Brain Bowl is here! Our own Karl Geil was our speaker this week. He presented



a talk on the history of the Brain Bowl and the need for manpower to successful.

The Brain Bowl is an academic competition for sixth, seventh, and eighth graders. Teams of up to six students compete against each other by answering questions on a variety of subjects. The morning sessions is a round robin style of competition with total point accumulation determining team advancement to the elimination rounds. Those rounds are played in the afternoon culminating with awards for first, second, and third place teams. There are three regional competitions with the placing teams advancing to a final championship tournament.

The Brain Bowl was started in 1983 by the Buckingham Square (now Gateway) Optimist Club. After ten years, the tournament was languishing primarily because of lack of manpower. Monaco South then took the tournament and made it a CO/WY District effort with up to 30 clubs providing manpower and financial resources to support the competition. The Brain Bowl project won an Optimist International award for multi-club educational project of the year in 2006. Last year nearly 200 teams competed in the three regional tournaments.

This year we expect more teams with 104 teams registered for the North Regional Tournament alone. We will need approximately 175 volunteers for each tournament. Volunteers will be needed as readers, runners, scorekeepers, timers, proctors and various other administrative activities. The readers must attend a special independent training session while all others will be trained on the day of the tournaments. Volunteers must show up at the competition venues between 6:30 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. Volunteers need not be Optimist members to help on this project.
