#### Our Speaker, Chris Ebersberg

SolarCity Feld Consultant

**Mark Metevia** introduces our speaker this morning. <u>Chris Ebersberg</u> is here to speak to us about SolarCity and solar power. SolarCity is the largest provider of solar power in the United States.

It all begins with the sun and how that energy, sunlight, begins the process of growth. SolarCity's website (<a href="http://www.solarcity.com/">http://www.solarcity.com/</a>) proclaims, "We believe in a better way to power homes and usinesses at a lower cost while contributing to a cleaner planet." For millions of years the deposits of oil and coal, which are used to fuel our cars and light our homes, have been collecting. How those fuels affect our environment has become increasingly important as our population increases and the demand for them continues.

Solar Power is the conversion of sunlight into electricity using either photovoltaics or concentrated solar power. The use of photovoltaics for home energy is the foundation of the Solar City model. In the past, there was a break-even point of 5-8 years. The solar panels were bulky and inefficient with the energy generated being expensive. Through improvements in the panels themselves as well as the technology to convert the energy, the costs have been reduced. Solar City is now installing 700 roof top systems per month in Denver. There are 15,000 of these rooftop systems in Denver and 40,000 along the Front Range.

In Denver, 15% of the homes are able to get 100% of their electricity from solar panels. Estimates that there will be over 100,000 such homes in the next 8 years. The cost

of the systems have been reduced along with their improvements in efficiency. Tax credits offered by Federal and local governments make the out of pocket expenses very attractive. Solar City even advertises free installation of these systems. This is dramatically changed from the early days of solar power when systems would cost in the area of \$40,000 on average. Solar City has streamlined the process of the installation of these systems and installation can take as little as a day. Also included with these systems are an additional meter, which measures the amount of

energy, being generated by the solar panels. As this amount is monitored, with the volume the home is using is also the possibility of sending excess energy back to the power company, in our case Xcel Energy. The cost of our current methods of energy is another factor that is considered in this equation. Xcel has proposed rate increases for its customers, along with tiered systems that charge more for electricity during peak demand periods. If you factor in the cost of electricity in Arizona and California, the time to consider these Solar systems could be now. In theory the clean energy generated from these solar panels, reduced costs to the homeowner for electricity make this option worth considering.
