only \$10. Good for both groceries and gas at your local market, reload them with your rewards card and benefit both yourself and provide the club with some additional income.





#### Ann Rowe Candidate for Denver Public School Board

ing and writing.

Our speaker today was Ann Rowe, wife of member **Tom** 

**Rowe** and current representative of District 1 to the Denver Public School Board, and also Vice President. Ann has been a member of the Board for the past 4 years and is running for office again in this years general election to be held on November 3, 2015. Ann started by saying that DPS is the fastest growing school system in the state and that the "flight to the suburbs has been reversed." She said that the Board has a "Denver Plan 2020" which reduced the goals for DPS from twenty-one to five. Ann went on to explain the five goals.

The plan's primary goal—<u>Great Schools</u> in Every Neighborhood—calls for 80 percent

of all DPS students in every neighborhood to attend a highperforming school by 2020. Currently 61 percent of students attend a school rated "Green" or "Blue" on the district's School Performance Framework, and the Denver Plan lays out specific high-impact strategies for DPS to increase the number of high-quality schools in every neighborhood.

When the first Denver Plan was launched in 2005, only 33 percent of students were at grade level on state assessments; DPS had one of the lowest rates of year-on-year academic growth among medium and large districts in the state; and 39 percent of students graduated on-time. Today, 48 percent of students are proficient on state assessments; DPS has ranked at the top in year-on-year academic growth for three straight years among major districts; and the district-wide graduation rate has increased by 23 percent. Persistent achievement gaps continue to exist, however, for students of color, students who are learning English as a second language and students who are in poverty.

The Denver Plan outlines specific goals and strategies designed to close academic achievement gaps and prepare all students for success. In addition to the goal to create Great Schools in Every Neighborhood, four additional goals will guide DPS' efforts.

<u>A Foundation for Success in School</u>: 80 percent of DPS third grade students will be at or above grade level in read-

<u>Ready for College and Career</u>: the four year graduation rate for students who start with DPS in ninth grade will increase to 90 percent. DPS will double the number of students who graduate from college from 1,100 to 2,200.

Support the Whole Child: ensuring that each school environment encourages students to pursue their passions and interests, supports physical and mental health, and ensures students continue to develop socially and emotionally.

<u>Close the Opportunity Gap</u>: the graduation rate for African American and Latino students will increase by 25 percentage

points, to 89 percent. Third grade reading and writing proficiency will increase by 25 percentage points, to 75 percent.

**John Wachter** asked Ann if she was aware of the study that said that 3<sup>rd</sup> grade reading proficiency was the single best indicator of future success. Ann said that she was and that currently only 60 percent of students are at grade level. Ann also said that emphasis is being placed on English Language Learners in an attempt to bring them up to the standards.

**Karl Geil** said he was aware that there was strong support for Spanish speakers, but wondered what support there was for other languages. Ann said that, to the extent possible DPS provides support for other languages on an "as needed" basis

When asked about opportunities for higher education, Ann said that the Denver Scholarship Foundation was established 7 years ago to provide the tools, knowledge, and financial resources essential for success in attaining a postsecondary education. She also mentioned the concurrent enrollment program, which allows high school students to be enrolled in college classes while attending high school. Ann closed by saying that she believes the current school board has done an excellent job and that she hopes to continue to serve in her capacity as a Board member in providing a school system that is *"What's best for the kids!"*
