For those who can remember...

on this day in 1936 the US Baseball Hall of Fame elects its first members in Cooperstown, New York: Ty Cobb, Babe Ruth, Honus Wagner, Christy Matthewson, and Walter Johnson.

The Hall of Fame actually had its beginnings in 1935, when plans were made to build a museum devoted to baseball and its 100-year history. A private organization based in Cooperstown called the Clark Foundation thought that establishing the Baseball Hall of Fame in their city would help to reinvigorate the area's depression-ravaged economy by attracting tourists. To help sell the idea, the foundation advanced the idea that US Civil War hero Abner Doubleday invented baseball in Cooperstown. The story proved to be phony, but baseball officials, eager to capitalize on the marketing and publicity potential of a museum to honor the game's greats, gave their support to the project anyway.

Karl also shared the following experience regarding our club's impact:

Sometimes I think we wonder, or at least I wonder, whether what we do really makes a difference to anyone. I was reminded recently that it does. Back around Christmas time I was buying some office supplies in a local Office Depot, when I heard someone behind me say: "Excuse me, Mr. Geil?" When I turned around, a young, African-American man held out his hand to me and said: "I don't know if you remember me. My name is Enoch Arthur-Asmah." I certainly did remember him.

Back in the early part of this century I was our Club's Oratorical Contest Chair. One year we were in the middle of conducting our Club's Oratorical Contest when a 6th grader by the name of Enoch Arthur-Asmah entered the room. I did not know in advance that he was coming. He had all the required materials with him, so I let him compete. He was exciting, dynamic and personable. Unfortunately, his speech was so short, that the penalty points assessed put him in last place. I spoke with him after the contest, explained the rules to him, told him I thought had had written and delivered a good speech, but that he needed to familiarize himself with the contest rules and prepare with those rules in mind, and I encouraged him to come back next year.

The following year, and the two years after that, he won both our Club and our Zone Oratorical Contests. In high school he went on to become an awardwinning member of George Washington High's speech and debate team. When he recognized me in the Office Depot, he wanted to thank me for the encouragement I gave him all those years ago, and to tell me that he had recently graduated from Yale University and was waiting to hear on his applications to MBA programs.

So, just in case you were wondering, what we do as Optimists does make a difference to people, and the people to whom we make a difference remember us.

John Barry President & Chief Executive Officer, Boys & Girls Clubs of Metro Denver

Pat Bush introduced our speaker, John Barry, the CEO of the Boys and Girls Club of Metro Denver. John had previously served as the superintendent of the Aurora Public Schools for seven years, and prior to that spent 30 years in the USAF, retiring as a two-star major general. He brought with him a thank you gift for the club's efforts with the Thanksgiving Dinner and the Toy Drive benefiting the Boys and Girls Club.

Boys & Girls Clubs of America had its beginnings in 1860 with three women in Hartford, Connecticut: Mary Goodwin, Alice Goodwin, and Elizabeth Hammersley. They believed that boys who roamed the streets should have a positive alternative and decided to organize the first Club. A cause was born. In 1961, Boys Clubs of Denver was started at the Lincoln Park site by Bill Cope.

gram sites, including: 15 Clubs, 9 freestanding and 6 school based sites; plus 1 summer camp in the mountains near Ward, CO; and 3 PACE Programs in Denver middle schools operating during the day.

The Clubs recognize the need to support the whole child for success in school and in life. The approach and extent of services allows them to focus on each child's unique needs.

The scope ranges from "out-of-school-time" programs during the after school hours and throughout the summer to specialized programs like behavioral intervention and extended learning opportunities in addition to a summer camp.

John spoke about the club's ability to help kids realize that they have choices, and to expand their time frames in order to see beyond the near term and to imagine their future in college and beyond.
