Arapahoe County Sheriff's K9 Unit Arapahoe County Deputies Gordon Carroll and Kelly Draper

Frank Middleton introduced our guest speaker <u>Gordon Carroll</u> and <u>Kelly Draper</u>, Arapahoe County Deputies and Director/Handlers of the K-9 Dog Enforcement Division.

Also making a guest appearance was their newest member of the team, Depute Draper's Belgian Malinois dog named Hilo. Depute Carroll's dog is Thor and his credentials include 77 apprehensions and 13 engagements, "bites." Depute Carroll, a 30-year member of the department, heads the K-9 Team. His partner Kelly has been on the force for 15 years and this is his first term as a K-9 Handler. Previously he served as a "decoy" and training

"dummy." Good experience for seeing both sides of the deal.

Each dog lives with their handler 24/7 and bond with their families as well. The cost of each dog is \$10,000. Arapahoe County is blessed with a "lady angel" who pays for every new dog the Department acquires. There are now four dogs in the K-9 Corps and two more are soon to be added.

The K-9 Academy is the center for all activity related to training and bonding between all the officer handler's and dogs. It takes a minimum of six-weeks to complete the full training process. "Fun things" are used in much of the training, which includes toys, balls, wrestling, and romping. A yellow training ball can be seen in the photo. An electronic collar is used to manage behavior, but is used judiciously. It is also used as a safety measure when a dangerous or injurious situation is manifesting at a crime

scene. All K-9 dogs are trained to bite and takedown a suspect on any part of the body. They are also keenly trained to recognize specific identify scents in ambient air i.e. drugs, alcohol, body fluids and other suspicious odors.

Universal commands are used to control or manage the dogs. The preferred breeds are typically male German Shepherds and Belgian Malinois. A dog sensing suspicious ambient air, leading to a probable search is one of the main functions of the K-9 Corps.

In the line of fire on a regular basis, only one dog has been shot; a small miracle in the Arapahoe County K-9

Corps. It happened in Cherry Hills by a woman out of control with a loaded weapon. The dog was shot in the front forearm and after recovering, was subsequently retired with honors.

Hilo was in frisky form chasing his rubber ball, jumping around with his handler Depute Draper. At one point Hilo made a beeline to **Gary Strowbridge** and his pipe and

started barking excitedly. Gary would not comment when later asked what was in his pipe. Very Interesting!

Dogs are becoming an integral part of law enforcement in Arapahoe County and their future is bright. Officers Carroll, Draper, and their pals will always be welcome at the Monaco South Optimist Club.
