

Bryce Slaby on the issue of immigration says that employers who hire illegals should be prosecuted, Rep. DeGette agrees. Harry Fegley comments that the need for single subject rule needs to be enforced. When legislation is proposed, the ability to tack on other items should be limited. Rep. DeGette agrees with this as well. Ron Gustas thanks Rep. DeGette for her work and support for the Diabetes research. As co-chair of the bipartisan Congressional Diabetes Caucus, Rep. DeGette has also been a long-time advocate for the expansion of diabetes care and research, particularly for lower-income and minority communities. Ed Collins asks about cyber security and how those responsible for computer crimes are held responsible. Rep. DeGette says we need to do much more to protect our resources from outside forces looking to do harm.

US Congresswoman Dianna DeGette

Chief Deputy Whip & Representing the 1st District of Colorado

Frank Middleton introduces our speaker this morning, Congresswoman <u>Dianna DeGette</u>. Chief Deputy Whip Diana DeGette is serving her tenth term in Congress as Representative for the First District of Colorado.

She flew in from Washington last night and joins us this morning. Much can be said about what is going wrong in our nations' capital; this morning Congresswoman DeGette talked about what is working. After the last election, Democrats became concerned because more Republicans were elected. In fact they held the most

seats since 1929. From her perspective elected officials are sent to Washington to do the nations work. To enact legislation that will ensure the country is strong, stable and in a position to keep improving. Unfortunately she says, gerry-mandering at the state level has allowed Republicans and Tea Party advocates, "Freedom Caucus" as they prefer to be called, to gain more of a voice and stall legislation that they oppose. The ability to debate and implement bills is the duty of Congress, but should the government be shut down over the issue of whether Planned Parenthood be funded?

In the past House Speaker Paul Ryan (R) has reached across the aisle and worked with Nancy Pelosi (D) to insure that important items such as Tax Credits are continued, Doctors are paid for Medicaid care, and funding for Bio Medical research is continued. Congresswoman DeGette is one of Congress's leading experts on cutting-edge scientific research and is a recognized leader on the subject of human embryonic stem cell research. As the Democratic leader of the bipartisan 21st Century Cures initiative, Rep. De-Gette is working to make medical research discoveries in the lab into treatments and cures for patients. This ambitious effort seeks to remake our medical research system to reflect the current environment for researchers, patients, doctors, drug and medical device developers, and everyone involved in treating diseases. Sadly, much of the good legislation that has been passed in the house then goes on to the Senate, where "good bills go to die." She has continued with the idea that the public wants our nations elected officials to work together in important ideas such as infrastructure and affordable healthcare.

Projections for the coming elections are that the country will see a 50-50 split in the Senate, relying on the Vice Pres-

ident to cast the deciding vote on bills. In the House, she is hopeful that Democrats will win seats but is committed to use Bi Partisan cooperation to work for the good of the people. Questions from the audience: Frank Middleton asks "How can entitlement programs be self-sustaining?" Rep. DeGette says that Social Security is and that Medicaid is one program that needs to be looked at. How can both sides work together so future generations can be helped and not wait until the program is in crisis mode. Eliminating caps, raise the age for eligibility are some

of the questions that need to be resolved.

"How do you defeat ISIS?" Cooperation the US and its partners in the region are key. The US can work in a strategic and planning role but the military in the affected countries are the primary defense providers in this battle. Troops on the ground must be provided by those countries, with Saudi Arabia providing more help.

On immigration policy. She is opposed to a wall on the border with Mexico and thinks that Donald Trump's plan is a bad one. The borders do need to be secure, and a path to citizenship should be established for the 11 million people who are already in this country illegally. She is opposed to tearing families apart, instead having those that are here to get in the back of the line, pay a penalty and begin the process. She is clear in the idea that no Immigration Policy has been worked on because the Speaker of the House will not bring the issue to a vote. She has been working with Democrats and Republicans on a bill that would address this but the vote cannot be made until the Speaker presents it.

Dick Nickoloff comments that people are frustrated because it seems as though nothing is getting done. Neither party is without blame. Rep. DeGette answers by saying she understands the frustration but the ability to have a vote on legislation proposed is a sticking point. The minority party is unable to have bills brought to the floor, important business to the country is not discussed. Pat Bush then states that both parties are guilty of this and that it seems whichever party holds the majority, that party pushes their agenda. Rep. DeGette disagrees, saying there enough lawmakers that hold the middle ground, but progress is stalled by those on far right or far left who are unwilling to compromise.
