Entertainment Books



Our Speaker Today: Commander Kris Kroncke, Denver Police District Three

Kris Kroncke was named Commander of the Denver Police Department (DPD) District Three office in April of this year. Kris highlighted for us all the activities surrounding the Democratic National Convention and gave us the inside scoop on how the DPD so efficiently was able to handle the crowds, protesters and parades during that week.

DPD partnered with all the surrounding cities to help in the effort. Planning efforts started 1-2 years in advance. After acquiring special equipment with Federal grants, and conducting specialized training to be coordinated with all the other Districts and jurisdictions directly involved, DPD launched their round the clock effort to keep our citizens safe. Starting on August 23rd, and continuing through the end of the convention, our stalwart DPD officers worked 12-16 hour shifts to monitor the over 75,000 people swarming in and around downtown Denver for the convention. While all of the DPD officers were busy with the convention and ongoing crime fighting, members of other jurisdictions such as LoneTree, Aurora, etc. helped staff the various administrative functions in the DPD police stations.

10 person response teams along with mounted patrol and the famous RDV-Rapid Deployment Vehicle (an ATV) helped with crowd control and rapid response to problem areas. The RDV employed a large speaker on the front that many believed would blast an unhearable sound that would cause protesters to uncontrollably empty their colons (myth... but it was effective!!). The most interesting protest was the "Shake your Money Maker" where the Red Wizard attempted to "levitate" the Mint, thereby spilling millions of \$\$ to the people. Needless to say, nothing moved. Our intrepid men in uniform had to deal with bags of poop (our guys know about that!), nails and screws in the streets, sleeping dragons (used by protesters to chain themselves together, but effectively managed by the DPD "Cut Team") and bottles of yellow liquid, not fit for consumption.

All-in-all the DPD did a fantastic job of minimizing the chaos and disruption, keeping our citizens and visitors safe, and showing Denver as a proud and beautiful place to live. Unfortunately, Kris now has to spend his valuable time testifying at trials for arrested protesters who refuse to plead out and disappear-but hey!...that's what American freedom is all about!
