Reflection on CU Football: Donlie Smith announced if CU had won the Friday Night PAC-12



He went on to point out that last year on this same Friday, Saturday, & Sunday, weekend we sold 367 trees and need all the help we can get.

Bob Rhue

Former member & MSOC Charter President Speaking on Animal Rescue and Welfare

Bob Rhue was Charter President for Monaco South in 1976 and is now returning as our Guest Speaker this morning, talking about the Animal Rescue programs he is closely associated with. He noted that it has been 30 years since his last Monaco South meeting. After spending a short career in the practice of law he discovered 1979, the joy of earning a living collecting and dealing coins. He also made his first contact with the Dumb Friends League and thereafter became immersed in the activities of animal rescue.

"Transporting" is a rescue program conducted on Indian Reservations to recover thousands of free roaming dogs, to perform neutering services, and to then transport them to Denver for adoption. The Transporting is also involved with horses and mustangs. He also visits Mexico twice a year for the same purpose. The most recent trip rescued and neutered over 500 dogs and 1000 cats, preventing 1000's of unwanted animals from being born. Humanitarian acts of kindness also occur in the oceans and seas as well.

One of the most endangered species are sharks, who are cruelly subjected to poachers cutting fins off and leaving them to die a slow and painful death. In Thailand elephants are in need of special attention and protection as well.

Animal Rescue Services worldwide promulgate respect for animals and their lives. Over 10 billion animals are slaughtered for food in the USA each year. One program Bob encourages is Meatless Monday. If everyone observed this effort a 14% drop in animal deaths would occur. Factory farming is a problem for human consumption of animals. especially where the use growth hormones and cages are involved. There is an incredible amount of inhumane treatment processes used in factory farming. Some examples are pigs in gestation cages and chickens in stacking cages. The Humane Society of the United States, magazine, "All

Animals, Nov/Dec issue" provides this type of data and solutions. (Explore this issue by CLICKING HERE.) It should be noted, the Humane Society has over 100 Animal Rescue and Protection Initiatives in force at this time. One of their main issues is concentrated on pulling back on the industry of dog and race horse meat for pet food. "Kill Buyers," purchase animals at auction and then ship them to Mexico or Canada for pet food slaughtering. Horses Photos Noel Hasselgren get a top dollar of \$25 at auction. Food for pets pro-

grams focus on animal owners who "hoard" pets they cannot feed. In situations where there is no means to feed animals they step in and rescue the abused and hungry animals. Some 800 horses were saved recently and all were adopted.

Compassion fatigue. is a side effect for many volunteers. A need to talk about successes among themselves and support for their efforts is crucial. Animal Rescue can be emotionally draining and optimism is a key ingredient to keeping a good attitude and internal strength.

Questions asked were:

- What about squirrels and Canadian Geese? Sorry but there is no answer other than they are free to roam and America is a great place to be alive.
- What about John Robbins book on Animal welfare and rights? Bob affirmed it is a great book and everyone interested in animal rescue should read it.
- What are "Free range" chickens? Nine billion factorycaged chickens are slaughtered each year, however the number is dropping because of the public cry for chickens not caged and treated more humanely. There is a terrific amount of growth hormones, antibiotics and chemicals used to grow and process animals for slaughtering. This includes the adrenaline secreted just before slaughter. Let the buyer beware.

Bob closed by pointing out many school lunch programs are now trending to meatless, or at the minimum a Meatless Monday. Also, there has been an uptick in the use of "undercover workers" embedding the industry to expose some of the horrendous and cruel methods used in slaughtering practices. He also said some of the most optimistic animals he has observed are goats.

President Craig thanked Bob for his fascinating and

eye-opening presentation and urged him to visit again soon. It was a pleasure to hear from our Club's 1st President and we are all proud of the humanitarian and noble work he has been immersed in and supporting.
