

#### Speaker, Steve Smith—Incarceration in Colorado

who sought to help them through this very difficult time and prepare them for a productive life in society, when they left prison.

Thoughts of how could a family live through that, and the empathy for her were strong emotions. Now he knows of this pain through his family's own experi-Bob Avery shares his sons ence and he stands before us this morning to introduce Steve Smith, Director of CCI.

Steve shares that CCI looks to give inmates the skills and training to successfully reenter society once their time in prison has ended. Steve says he is in the business of rebuilding and creating. When he first met Bob and Dorcas Avery he agreed to look into Steven Avery's situation. CCI has 2,000 jobs and with the inmate population of 23,000 demand for them is high.

CCI has companies in the correctional system that vary from furniture manufacturing to raising tilapia. from making saddles to a 100 head heard of water buffalo that produce milk for cheese. (A complete list of CCI's products can be found at www.coloradoci.com.

The hope is to give inmates a reason to wake up in the morning, to learn a skill or trade and conduct themselves in a positive manner. Inmates undergo a rigorous screening process before entering the CCI program and must exhibit progress. Wages paid to inmates for their work also have expenses such as child support, and the cost of incarceration deducted to help defray the cost to tax payers. On average, the cost to

incarcerate a prisoner is \$30,000 annually, and this does not account for the wages that person would be earning in society. This illustrates the high cost of the skyrocketing prison population.

The average stay for an inmate is two years and CCI hopes to give them a productive way to spend this time and some- CCI, a division of the Colorado thing to prepare them for

society when they are released.

Bob Avery gave a speech in December about the Seven Habits on the inside, based on Stephen Covey's book, 7 Habits of Highly Successful People. Correctional officers are encouraged to take the class as well, and it reinforces the sense that the prison is a community where they are dependent on everyone to work together and cooperate. 97% of inmates return to society and it is in everyone's interest to have good habits practiced. Recidivism rates for inmates participating in CCI program are 25% compared to 52% in general population of the prison system, the evidence is there that the programs are working.

Bob commented on his dream to see his son become a productive member of society before he dies. How we as a society need to examine the ways we deal with nonviolent criminals and utilize the limited resources society has to spend. We all share this hope and thank Bob for his strength in addressing this topic with the club this morning.
