Our Speaker Ed Augden Colorado Alliance for Retired Americans

John Stoffel introduced Ed Augden as our guest speaker this morning. Ed is the president of the

Colorado Alliance for Retired Americans. See there webpage at

Ed retired from Denver Public Schools in 2000 after spending over thirty years in DPS. The Colorado Alliance for Retired Americans is affiliated with the AFL-CIO. Their mission is "To advance public policy that protects the health and economic security of older Americans." The organization reviews legislation that affects seniors, then writes letters, and lobbies the legislature on behalf of seniors. They also sponsor voter drives and organize demon-

strations to fight for affordable and accessible prescription drugs, health care through expansion of Medicare and expansion of Social Security systems to provide guaranteed benefits for the remainder of a senior's life. Ed indicated that the Alliance is against the privatization of Social Security and for a single payer nation-

al health care system. They believe that "for profit" health providers drive up the cost of health care and that many other countries with socialized health care systems provide superior health care for their citizens. They also fight for protection of pensions, affordable housing, community services, and tax cuts for seniors. Ed and John passed out membership applications.
