



Brain Bowl Report: By Karl Geill Here is the report from last Saturday's North Region Optimist Brain Bowl. Volunteers: 145, including, from MSOC, **George Buzick, Kent Gloor** (and wife Abigail), **Randy Marcove, Paul Simon** (along with wife Debbie and two non-Optimist friends), **Craig Eley, Mike McMahon, Harry Fegley, Michael Chavez, John Oss, Mike Snipes** (and wife Ann), **Phil Perington, Paul Bernard, Mark Goodbody, Frank Ross** and **Karl Geil**. Counting Paul Simon's two guests and his wife, but not Abigail or Ann, who are members of the Tamarac Optimist Club, MSOC accounting for 18 volunteers, second only to the Boulder Luncheon Club's 20. Team Registrations: 95, Team Drops: 3, Team No-Shows: 1.

So, 91 teams actually competed, including one school from Casper, Wyoming. Estimating 5 students per team, that is approximately 455 kids participating.

Our Speaker Today - Lyra Repplinger Colorado Oral-Deaf Preschool

Lyra Repplinger began the position of classroom teacher at the Colorado Oral-Deaf Preschool in June 2011. Lyra received her Bachelor's Degree in Communication Science and Disorders from Augustana College in Rock Island, IL in 1997. She received her Master's in Deaf and Hard of Hearing Education from Illinois State University in 2000.



Lyra explained that the organization is a nonprofit organization that opened the preschool in June 2011 for children with hearing loss. After receiving a cochlear implant or hearing aid, children and families need the support, services and resources the preschool will provide to enable these children to hear, listen, learn, and speak as well as to prepare them to be mainstreamed into public or private schools.

"What is oral education? There are many ways to describe the education of children with hearing loss, and it can be confusing for parents seeking the best option for their child. Simply put, oral-deaf education (or auditory-oral education) facilitates the child's development of age-appropriate listening and speaking

skills, in spite of hearing loss, without the use of sign language. Instead of learning sign language to communicate, teachers and parents speak to the child as they would to any other child. Children are encouraged to rely on their ability rather than their disability." (Excerpted from the website: www.oraldeafpreschool.org.)

Lyra explained that the school is relatively new; they currently have 6 students in their program; and she is the only teacher. She welcomed all to visit the school. You can also find information on the website noted above.

What is oral education?

There are many ways to describe the education of children with hearing loss, and it can be confusing for parents seeking the best option for their child. Simply put, oral-deaf education (or auditory-oral education) facilitates the child's development of age-appropriate listening and speaking skills, in spite of hearing loss, without the use of sign language. Instead of learning sign language to communicate, teachers and parents speak to the child as they would to any other child. Children are encouraged to rely on their ability rather than their disability.

The school serves four groups of students:

- ◊ Hearing impaired: early intervention, 1-2 years of age
- ◊ Hearing impaired: preschool, 3-5 years of age
- ◊ Hearing impaired: early elementary, 6-8 years of age
- ◊ Normally hearing preschool, 3-5 years of age
