Memorial Day

This weekend, we celebrate Memorial Day. It is a tradition that dates back to the Civil War. It began as Decoration



Day when a group of Union veterans in Decatur, IL decided to establish a day when they would decorate the graves of fallen soldiers of the Civil War with flowers.

A Confederate version of the tradition soon sprang up but was observed on the different day. By the 20th century, the two versions had combined and eventually included honoring all Americans who died while in military service. In the south, whole families would gather to decorate the graves of their ancestors who had died in military service. These gatherings would include formal meals and serve as reunions of family members who had moved away from their roots. Today millions of Americans travel to see family and friends on Memorial Day as well as remembering our fallen soldiers. Memorial Day is considered as marking the beginning of

summer while Labor Day signals the end of summer. The most notable ceremony on Memorial Day is when the President of the United State places a wreath on the memorial of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery.

King Sooper's & Safeway Cards: Greg Young reminds all members to purchase and use King Soop-




ers and Safeway Gift Cards as a way of raising funds for the optimist club. The cards are reloadable and the

Martha Sipeki RTD FasTracks Public Information Liaison

Our speaker this morning was <u>Mar-tha Sipeki</u> with the FastTrack's program. FastTrack's is a multi-billiondollar expansion of the Denver area's mass transit project. The voters approved FastTrack's in 2004 to build 122 miles of commuter and light rail lines; 18 miles of bus rapid transit lanes and some 21,000 new parking spots at 31 new Park-n-Ride locations. To date over 5.5 billion dollars has been committed or spent on the project.

FastTrack's has created over 15,000

new full-time jobs since 2005. It is estimated that for every one dollar spent on the FastTrack's program, four dollars is pumped into the Denver Metro area economy. In 2016 five separate projects will be completed including the Flatiron Flyer rapid transit bus line between Boulder and Denver, the A-Line out to the Airport, the B-Line to Westminster, the G-Line to Arvada and Wheat Ridge, the R-Line along I-225

through Aurora. Construction on the N-Line to Thornton and Northglenn is continuing and due to be completed in 2018 and ground has been broken on the Southeast Rail extension.

The system is a mix of commuter and light rail trains the difference being light rail is slower (55 mph maximum speed) smaller trains that are more maneuverable in tighter neighborhoods and commuter trains are larger, faster (79 mph top speed) trains that can carry larger numbers of people.

Projects that have already been completed as part of the FastTrack's program are the W-Line to Golden and the Union Station redevelopment project. Future projects include the Southeast and Southwest rail line extensions, the northwest line up through Boulder, Niwot and Longmont and the extension of the N-Line to Brighton.
